



1. Participants

Online survey, 1128 participants

- 54% male, 36% female, 9% transgender, including 79 nonbinary participants
- Age range 18-80, mean 29, median 26
- 75% have university level education
- 82% identify as politically liberal





2. Nonbinary participants and their relationship with pronouns

What pronouns do nonbinary participants use? (n=72)

- They the most commonly used pronoun
 - 36 participants (50%) listed *they* as their only pronoun
 - 59 participants (82%) listed *they* as one (or only) alternative
- 10 participants listed neopronouns: ze, xe, e, ae, ey, zhe
- Only 5 nonbinary participants used only *he* or *she*
- 3 participants listed *it* as a suitable pronoun


- practical reasons

"I currently ask people to use 'they'. I wish I could realistically ask for 'xe'."

"(...)I don't have a single 'correct' pronoun that I ask people to use. In situations where people know me, however they know me by is fine. (...)" "In an ideal world, I would ask people to use neutral terms, 'they/ze', however I do not do this yet because of practical reasons"

"I prefer for my friends to use they/them, but prefer strangers to use he/him."

Importance of correct pronouns

- 68% (52) felt it was important that others use their correct pronouns
- Context matters:
 - where and who
 - avoiding conflict (safety)

"I can't reasonably expect strangers and people I haven't come out to to do so. (...)" "[It's important], unless I am in the company of people who may cause me harm if I were to give my correct pronouns."

When someone uses the wrong pronouns, it feels like...

 80% reported negative feelings, expressions of hurt and invalidation

" Mostly tired and invisible, some days it hurts more than others"

" It makes me feel like I don't actually exist. Like I'm not human."

" Upset, frustrated, irritated, tired, sad, dysphoric."

" Discomfort. Reminders of difference between myself and society's expectations."

"Sad, bitter, resentful. I don't say anything, though."

Experiences of language use as discrimination

- 80% have felt discriminated by language use
 - feelings of exclusion, invalidation

"(...) people like me are commonly left out of conversation and the validation of our identities is often dismissed as us being whiny."


"I've heard several people actively mock neo-pronouns to my face, which feels invalidating and sometimes intimidating (...) It indicated that they don't respect my identity."

"(...) people very often use language that is heterosexist and cissexist, and it's consistently made me feel unsafe. (...)"







3. Attitudes towards nonbinary pronouns




Attitudes

- Optional open answer questions: What is your view on X?
- Nonbinary they 461 responses (~9400 words)
- Neopronouns ze and xe 635 responses (~15900 words)
- (Corpus assisted) thematic analysis





nonbinary participants (n=30/39)



To sum up...

- various nonbinary pronouns, they most common
- neopronouns weird, they more neutral/accepted
- attitudes vary based on gender
- pronouns matter
 - reflection of identity
 - validation / conflict
- what can we do?
 - avoid cissexist language
 - help normalize nonbinary pronouns
